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Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I look at my calendar and see that June has filled up and I will be away for much of it. I am taking 3 vacation days in the first week to play. Several days of the 2nd week take me to Denver, Colorado where I will participate in a Mobility Conference for Region 2 which includes California, Nevada, Utah, Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico. Don Silsbe calls it a "Job Fair." It will give me an opportunity to meet Bishops from the Synods in that region. And then, there is Confirmation Camp from June 22nd to the 27th. Does that not sound balanced? There is a little play, a little proactive searching for a settled call and church stuff wrapped around it all too. The only problem is that there does not seem to be a lot of breathing room between these various activities that take me away from Southgate.

Life presents so many choices, so many opportunities as well as so many responsibilities. How difficult it is to prioritize and make the best choices, saying "no" to some things and "yes" to others. How difficult it is to know when to say, "I had better keep that day or that week open."

Usually we want to do it all and don't want to miss a thing. Sometimes we feel we **have** to do it all. We also sometimes foolishly think we **can** do it all. But, when the rubber hits the road, it becomes clear that we have physical, emotional, and mental limits to what we can handle.

Some of the scheduling and time management is beyond our control because others set the dates. The joke is on us though, when we suddenly wonder how we will manage all the tasks related to those things with which we have filled our calendars. What else can we do but trust God to help us stay in step, better yet, one step ahead so that everything falls neatly into place and we can let go of things that we might still accomplish at a later time?

Do you ever dream of the simple life? I do. Is there such a thing? I think there is. But, it seems harder and harder to achieve. It is difficult to maintain a healthy balance. But, God desires that for us. God wants us to experience *shalom* or a sense of wholeness and completeness. God blesses us with time to live fully and faithfully, working to care for all that God has given us. It begins with time spent in prayer - praising and thanking God, interceding for those in need, confessing, and finally listening for God's direction. When we ask ourselves how God would want us to live today, it becomes easier to prioritize the tasks we have before us and it becomes easier to weed out the less important things that clutter our lives.

I think of summer as a time when the pace changes and life ought to become a little simpler. The

long days seem to give us more energy and certainly more daylight to accomplish certain things as well as play too. Summer can help to restore some equilibrium in our lives. But, ultimately, when even my summer schedule seems too full or busy, I look to God for help. Helpful words come from last Sunday's Gospel, Matthew 6:24-34 -- "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear...And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life?...But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." (vs. 25a, 27, and 33) Balance is inevitably restored when we put God first and strive for God's kingdom. May you, with God's help, find that balance. May the summer months bring you relief from overly full calendars, as well as rest and renewal.

Join Peace Builds! Our Own Habitat for Humanity Team – Tuesday, July 29th

Do something this summer that you will never forget Do a hard day's work that will result in a home for a family that probably would never be able to get one on their own. I am organizing a team, and calling it Peace Builds! to help build a Habitat for Humanity Home on Tuesday, July 29th. I need at least 20 people. Friends of Peace are certainly welcomed too. Here are the facts:

- The house will be on Detroit's near east side (Chalmers, Mack area) –it will be a 35 minute drive taking I94 past downtown. We will car pool.
- Construction starts early, 6:30am on the job site. We will have to be on the road before 6:00 AM. It will be a long day!
- By the time our team day arrives, the house will have been framed, and the plumbing and electricity done. What will need doing at our week of the "build" will be tiling, painting, trim, yard work and clean up. There will be construction professionals on hand to teach what we have to know.
- Thrivent has paid all of our volunteer expenses – we will get meals, and a cool Habitat T-shirt, and the fun of working together.
- Even though I have committed us to only one day – we are welcomed to volunteer additional days that week if we want– our house is expected to be completed on August 2nd.
- It is very likely that we will be working side by side with the family that will be moving into the home.
- Everyone of all abilities and over the age of 16 is welcomed... 16 and 17 year olds must be accompanied by an adult responsible for them. 16 and 17 year olds will not be allowed to operate power tools, or climb on ladders.
- You must wear shoes, preferably hard toed. Safety glasses, hard hats will be provided, but if you have your own, use them. The same with power tools, and paint brushes. More on that once we have our team.

Because we will be a part of the Thrivent Builds program, the \$50 registration fee is waived. For more information please call the Thrivent Financial Downriver Associates office at 734-284-1838, and speak to Dan Dickhudt. Dan (whose own team is doing the framing on July 2nd) will be at our church on June 22nd to set up a display and talk about Thrivent Builds.

ELCA Synod Meeting Summary

Thanks for allowing me to represent our church at the Synod Meeting May 10th. It was held at First English Lutheran Church in Grosse Pointe Woods and it was a glorious experience. I came back knowing much more about our Southeast Michigan ELCA Church and its wide scope of missions.

I thought our bishop did a wonderful job running this meeting. The business included reports of many of the synods missions, elections of those who will serve on various committees, and who will represent us at the ELCA synod's "ALL Church" meeting this summer. There was a constitutional change that eliminated a lot of committees that are no longer active, or relevant.

Things I never knew before:

Our Lutheran Social Services of Michigan is the agency that provides more foster parents than any other agency in the state, and it also handles more adoptions than any other agency in the state, as well as more refugee services.

The ELCA mission called "Living Waters", which supports our two youth and family camps, Stony Creek and Michi-Lu-Ca reported that a recent survey of full time clergy revealed that 87% of them experienced a pivotal moment in their faith journey when they attended Lutheran camp. We at Peace should be committed to sending more of our youth to ELCA camps!

Since our synod moved from their Fisher Building office to their current home known as "Synod House" at 8115 E. Jefferson, in Detroit, they have saved over \$50,000 in annual expenses.

And – possibly good news for our call committee - This year, Southeast Michigan Synod, for the first time in many years, has had a great increase in the number of clergy outside our synod area indicating that they are desirous of a call in this synod.

Bishop John Schreiber had his 47th birthday that day, and is in his 21st year of ordained ministry. And in his report, he cites as critical issues facing the church:

- Numerical decline of ELCA members, even in light of many assets and resources and people to work with
- lack of diversity, with only 3% of ELCA who are persons of color,
- new models needed for leadership in domestic missions,
- an aging denomination with the average age of an ELCA Lutheran in the late 50s,
- the need of deepening the spiritual soil,
- the growing reality of poverty in this country and in the world.

- He strives for continued healthy conversations of issues of diversity, striving to define what it truly means to be a "whoever" church.

All that attended received copies of "Opening the Book of Faith", a model for a congregation wide as well as small group bible study

We had a "Gathering Service" resplendent with organ, brass and percussion, Gospel choir. The service used the new Hymnbook, called the "Cranberry" Book or the ELW, using for this service traditional songs that I hadn't heard in years, along with a hauntingly beautiful contemporary melody, accompanying with Latin words to welcome the Gospel reading.

All in all, I came away from this meeting thankful that our ELCA Southeast Michigan Synod has the people, the expertise, and the spiritual gifts that we should be embracing to enrich and grow our mission here at Peace.

Notes from the Side

Last month, I wrote about the important role that women play in our lives. This month, we turn our focus on our male role models. On June 15th, we celebrate Father's Day and recognize the men who have guided us along our earthly journey.

My father was (and still is) the traditional stoic father; firm but caring. My dad always seemed larger than life to me; a man of great stature until I surpassed him in height but even then the level of reverence never waned.

Looking back, I'm sure that I and my older brother and sister were at times a handful. I know with my two children that I often just stare at them and wonder where they came from!?! Being a parent and a father can be an interesting and trying experience; a real trial and yet a real blessing.

I think of the great men in my life such as my father and I realize that he taught me so much. From my father, I learned to be not just a man but also a gentleman. I have read that the best thing a man can do to serve as a role model to their children is to love and be kind to their mother. This month, my parents will be celebrating 40 years of marriage. We were instructed to not have our friends call or come to the door during the "dinner hour" because that was time set aside for the family. Even now when my family is enjoying dinner and the phone rings I catch myself thinking, "Who's calling during the dinner hour?"...I have to chuckle thinking about it.

Fathers have a great role to play in the lives of children. We, along with their mothers, have the responsibility to teach them and prepare them for life including their eternal life. This is a divine responsibility given to parents; one that should not be taken lightly. Fathers give all kinds of instruction to their children about such things as school, work, dating, driving and/or caring for a car but we also need to give them instruction regarding the Lord.

Faithful instruction is important; however, we have to be careful how we deliver it. All criticism and no praise is not good. In Ephesians 6:4, Paul said, "Fathers, do not exasperate your children; instead, bring them up in the

training and instruction of the Lord". In other words, don't keep on scolding and nagging your children, making them angry and resentful. We need to keep in mind what kind of role model we want to be for our children. Paul says to the Corinthians in I Corinthians 11:1, "Follow my example, as I follow the example of Christ." Now, take note that Paul didn't say, "Do everything I do." He said, do everything I do which is Christ-like or follow the example of Christ. Paul wasn't perfect and neither are we.

Brothers and sisters, there are some things that I have done in my life that I do not want my children to do. I am sorry for the times when I have given them a bad example. But I have also done some good things and some Christ-like things which I hope they will copy from my life. The most important thing is my love for their mother, my love for family, my love for people, and my love for Christ.

Let us give thanks to God for all fathers who have been godly illustrations to us; godly examples for us to follow. And let us be resolved that we continue to work towards being godly examples for our children to follow. Be blessed!

From Don's Desk



This will be a short note this month, as I am on a short break from packing boxes. In case you haven't heard, we've sold our house. The movers will come on May 27th, to take our things to North Carolina. We'll stay with Don and Dorothy Pushman for the month of June. Our last Sunday worship at Peace will be June 29th. We will certainly miss all of you, but we feel that God is asking us to go there, to care for my parents. I'll give you a long final message next month. Here's my short message for June.

There are a lot of reasons why May is one of my favorite months. This is the month when everything really springs to life in Michigan. There are the trees and flowers, of course, but I'm thinking mainly of the birds. This is when the birds' colors are most brilliant—especially the Cardinals and Goldfinches. This is also the month when the adolescent birds first take flight. One thing I notice every year about these adolescent birds is their eating behavior. When they are alone, they will peck around like an adult. But when one of their parents shows up, they scrunch down, and open their beaks as if to say “feed me, feed me”. I always laugh at this behavior. They've had their time in the nest, and they should be out on their own. They should be doing what birds should be doing, and not asking their parents to feed them.



Sometimes, in our church life, we can be like these adolescent birds! Our main focus on being fed, and not on being “out there”, doing what us birds should be doing. Being fed is certainly important. We all come to church for spiritual nourishment. But this should be a secondary function. Jesus didn't talk too much about being fed. But he talked a great deal about love, forgiveness, sharing, and doing things for others. Let's not be like those selfish young birds. Let's get together, and do the Lord's work!
