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## Pastor's Page

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Aloha from Hawaii!

We are all creatures of habit. Each of us has grown up with different traditions, some of which we cherish dearly and some of which we may wish would fall by the wayside. Some of these are family traditions and some are church traditions.

I grew up attending the Lutheran Church of Honolulu, a church that was established in 1900 by German immigrants in the business sector. My aunt whose 90<sup>th</sup> birthday we celebrated July 28<sup>th</sup> remembers the first location of the church on Beretania Street. She remembers having to leave the house on Saturday so that her father, my grandfather could pace the floors undisturbed while memorizing his sermon.

My aunt also remembers the church moving from Beretania Street to Punahou Street – its present location. She has seen it through several renovations the biggest of which moved the altar from the chancel end to one side with pews rearranged around it in a semi-circle. She has seen changes in how communion is served. She has also seen people come and go as they have all struggled with the various changes. When I was a youth my “built in twin” brother could serve as an acolyte but I could not because I was a girl. However, long before I was born, in the 1920’s or 30’s the church council included its first woman and my grandfather referred to members of the church as “sons **and daughters**” not just “sons.”

I remember when I came back for the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary and attended an evening vesper service which was what I would call a very “high church” service partly because it included incense at certain points in the service. What was most interesting and refreshing was to watch the thurifer (incense bearer), a high school youth as he proceeded down the aisles barefoot, which would probably have been unheard of in the early history of the congregation and certainly unheard of in most Midwestern congregations today. This may be something that horrifies some of you.

When I worshiped last Sunday, my aunt had forewarned me that the new pastor removes his

sandals to serve communion. In fact, he removed them to preach. She shared with me that this is the practice at Kawaiaha'o Congregational Church – the oldest Hawaiian congregation in the state. The pastors or *Kahuna Pule* take their shoes off in the altar or chancel area. But, the service last Sunday was highly liturgical with a cantor, choir and sung responsive psalm.

I share all of this to point out that how congregations worship may not look exactly the same, that those of us who have grown up in the church have become attached to many different traditions and we have experienced changes in tradition. I cannot begin to imagine the changes that my aunt and others who have lived 90 years have experienced. Yet the church continues to gather as the body of Christ around Word and Sacrament to praise God, to be nourished by God’s grace, and to be sent out to proclaim that grace to others.

Last month I wrote about accessibility, weekly communion, and continuous communion. I am proposing that we begin serving weekly communion in the fall. I would also like to propose that we alternate between a form of continuous communion at the altar rail, which you already do, and continuous communion served from the main floor which as you read this, you may have experienced twice. We would like to give you an opportunity to talk about continuous communion at a Town Hall meeting or Parlor Talk. Please watch for more information.

Such changes will impact those dedicated servants who make up the altar guild. Others will have to step forward to help ease the burden. Please prayerfully consider serving on the altar guild. This might be an opportunity for your whole family to work together helping the altar guild get ready for Sunday worship.

Remember, it is the unity we have in Jesus Christ that brings us together in the first place. “There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all.” (Ephesians 4:4-5)

## From Don's Desk

Over the years, I've learned that how someone worships God is a very personal thing. There is no one correct way to do this. It is a very individualistic experience. What "works" for one may not work for another.

It goes without saying that I enjoy the Lutheran liturgy. I was not born into the Lutheran faith like most; I chose to become Lutheran partly because of the formal style of worship that we use. I'm sure you know how much I love the LBW Setting 2 worship form. Did you know how much I enjoy the Order of Matins in the old blue book? Sometimes I scoot down to Historic Trinity, just to praise God with that old chestnut. I "get something out of" these worship services because they fit my worship style.

You may not know that I've worshipped God in a barn, on a rock in the river, and in a tent. Sometimes it was done with a formal liturgy, and sometimes it was a Pentecostal-style service (yes, with people passing out in the aisles). I have even sung in a Southern Baptist choir. I can honestly say that in every case, God was glorified, regardless of worship style. What made the difference for all those folks is that they were worshipping in a style that fit them.

What I have learned in the past couple of years is that most young people get very little out of our worship service. When you see my "kids" in church, it is more out of family duty than anything else. Our lovely old traditional service simply just doesn't push the right button for them. If we want to bring our Lord to younger people, we must give them something that works for them.

Some have said that we are not here to entertain, but to praise God. Aren't these the same people who are asking to sing old familiar hymns. Couldn't that also be considered a form of entertainment? I say that neither is entertainment. Both situations provide the Spirit with fertile soil in which to do the Lord's work.

As we explore ways to share the Good News in our community, let us keep an open mind to alternative forms of worship. Let's find that fertile soil, and bring our Lord to others.

## Reflection (Don Silsbe)

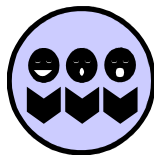

# Notes from the Side...

## Take the Time to Pray – Sermon Extension

from Sunday, July 22<sup>nd</sup> - Luke 10:38-10:42

Brothers and sisters, I write this article to you as some after thoughts on our Gospel reading from Sunday, July 22<sup>nd</sup>. During my sermon, I stated that we need to take time to pause and place ourselves at the feet of Christ; to listen to the Lord and see how we are to carry out His will in our lives. This has caused me to think deeper about taking time out of our day for prayer.

There are all kinds of prayer. There is a prayer to fit each particular situation or condition. There is public prayer, private prayer or individual prayer, corporate prayer, long prayers, short prayers, standing prayers, sitting down prayers, “while you walk” prayers, prayers of petitions, prayers of intercession, and prayers of repentance. Well, I’m sure you get my drift. There isn’t a special recipe for prayers; you just need to take the time to do it and engage in the prayer with your heart and soul.

During the sermon, we reflected on how we may get caught up in our “to do” lists. Don’t get me wrong; having a list of goals is a good thing. I have a list of goals for my life; some are long term, some are short term. I haven’t done the Dale Carnegie thing of writing them down so that I see them as a constant reminder but they are in the back of my head: 1) Be the best husband and daddy that I can be, 2) Finish my seminary education, 3) Develop a stronger prayer life, 4) And of course, find a job after my seminary education (my prayer is that I can find a church that will take me on as an associate pastor or a pastor).

These are just a few things I keep as my goals. We all have lists of things we would like to do in the next year, in the next week and even in the next day. And, as I stated earlier, there certainly is nothing wrong with that. But often a goal that we miss is developing a deeper prayer life. Now, I know that we all take a certain amount of time out of our day for God. For some, it is an enriching hour every day. But for most of us, including me, sometimes the busyness of daily demands begins to crowd out my time with God. When we allow the busyness of our lives to crowd in, our prayers (if we find the time to say them) can become what are referred to as vending machine prayers. We quickly put in our coins and punch in the numbers for what we want: A2-Forgiveness or D3-A Good Day.

Here are some interesting statistics that I came across that I would like to share with you. The average person lives 77 years, 28,105 days, or 672,000 hours. The average person spends 40 minutes on the telephone/day or approximately 2 years in a lifetime; watches 3 hours of TV/day or a little over 9 years in a lifetime; spends one hour/day in the bathroom for a total of approximately 3 years in the bathroom (sorry for the visual on that one). The average Christian spends less than 10 minutes a day in prayer with God, their truest friend; that’s less than 6 hours a month; 3 days a year; less than 7 months in a lifetime! This isn’t meant to guilt us into praying. Prayer isn’t forced or coerced. This is meant to pose the question of what has happened in the lives of Christians that we don’t sense a deep need for prayer in our lives.

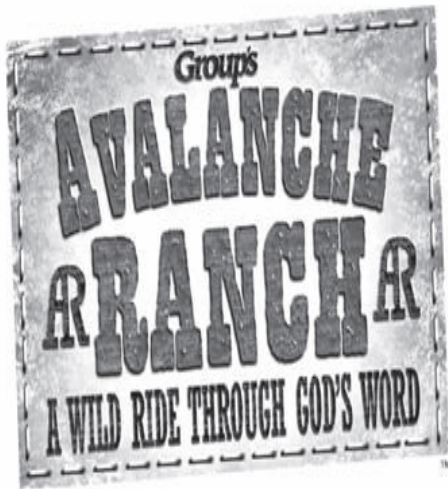
In the 22<sup>nd</sup> chapter of Luke, Jesus went out to the Mount of Olives, and his disciples followed him. He asked them to pray as He walked just a short distance from them where, He too, entered into prayer. When Jesus rose from prayer and went back to the disciples, He found them asleep. We need to ask ourselves if we desire to become more like Christ, who prays desperately for the Father’s will to be done in His own life, or are we more like Jesus’ disciples, asleep?

Wherever you may be on your journey this week as you read this article; be it prayerful or prayer less, you may desire a fresh touch from Him in your life. Take the time to enter into prayer. All He asks from us is this: “Be still, and know that I am God.” The most powerful yet powerless force on the earth is prayer. It is the most powerful when it is utilized and the most powerless when it is neglected.

Peace be with you, my brothers and sisters, as you enjoy this glorious month!
