Dear Friends in Christ,

I have enjoyed the summer very much so far, and would love it to continue long past August. But, it seems that when August arrives, we are suddenly nearly out of time to gear up for the fall. Planning is a never-ending and difficult process. What makes it difficult besides the fleeting nature of time, is the attention one needs to give to current concerns and themes whether internal or external.

My attention and the attention of the Interim Task Force lately, has been on dreams and more specifically, God's dream for Peace Lutheran Church. Guided by exercises in a book entitled *Living Lutheran* we have wrestled with this question: "If God had God's way with our congregation for five years, what do you see in our future?" and this statement: "God's purpose for our congregation is _____." The wrestling always begins with listening to scripture as well as the information gathered from you and from the community by the ITF. How would **you** answer the above question? How would **you** complete the above statement? What passages from scripture inform your responses?

Do you remember the story from the book of Genesis, of Jacob who dreamed of a ladder that reached from earth to heaven? Angels of God were climbing up and down the ladder. The Lord stood next to Jacob and said, "I am the Lord, the God of Abraham your father and the God of Isaac; the land on which you lie I will give to you and to your offspring; and your offspring shall be like the dust of the earth, and you shall spread abroad to the west and to the east and to the north and to the south; and all the families of the earth shall be blessed in you and in your offspring. Know that I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land; for I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you."

Now there's a dream! – Jacob will be given land and his offspring will spread everywhere. Not only that but **all** families will be blessed in them. The Lord will be with and keep Jacob wherever he goes.

Later, as Jacob traveled to meet Esau in the hope of appeasing him because he had stolen his birthright, he spent one night wrestling with a man who turned out to have been God. Jacob was struck on the hip socket and his hip put out of joint by God. As dawn broke, this divine being asked to be released. But, Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me." Right then and there Jacob was blessed and given a new name, the name of "Israel," because he had wrestled with God and humans and prevailed. The place where this happened Jacob called "Peniel" because he had seen God face to face and yet his life was preserved. But from then on he walked with a limp forever marked

by his encounter with God. He went on to be welcomed by his brother Esau and their relationship was restored.

I hear in the first story, God's dream for all people – that they will be blessed. I also hear God's promise to be present wherever we go. I hear in the second story, that when we encounter God, we are both challenged and changed forever. God has and does bless us. God certainly makes a difference in my life. Does God make a difference in your life? If God dreams of blessing all families and has so generously blessed us, how might we in turn, bless others and so be a part of God's mission and dream? As we think about moving into the Fall let us take on that challenge, wrestle with it, and see where God leads us.

May God give us all strength for the struggle!

A Summer Learning Opportunity

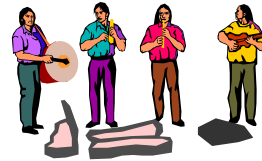

Hot off Todd's computer..... Moments of Pure Joy!

I had a real eye opening experience several years ago as Barb and I were driving through the intersection of Monroe and Outer Drive in Dearborn. As we passed the intersection, there was a 20-something man trying to push his broken down car out of the intersection by himself. This was certainly a situation where someone was in need.

I quickly pulled my car ahead a couple hundred feet, got out of my car and ran back to help him. We both pushed. After a few seconds the car was moving enough to where the man could jump in and steer to the side and after another moment or two, stop his car safely on the side of the road. After, we exchanged quick pleasantries and went our separate ways.

When I got back in my car, I realized my muscles were revolting a bit, after pushing a 3000lb object. And my heart was racing as if I just ran a marathon. I should have felt exhausted, but I didn't. I felt exhilarated. I felt relieved. And most peculiar, I felt joy. Not just, a little happy, but an almost pure, perfect joy. Joy in helping someone who was facing a tough situation and suddenly being an unexpected angel swooping in to help. I don't even remember if the guy thanked me, but it didn't matter. It was the right thing to do. If anything, I should have thanked him for allowing me to experience that joy.

I put my own concerns aside that night, such as pulling a muscle, or getting hit by another car, or leaving my wife alone in the car while I ran out to help a perfect stranger. The joy I felt wasn't something I learned. It wasn't something I sought. Rather, it was something Godly. It was something about just doing 'the right thing'. I put my own concerns aside, and helped someone who needed help. This was good. This was right.

Spinning that, what joy's have we experienced in our congregation. For me, one would be VBS. What a joyous thing it is to see my 2 girls, along with a nice sized group of other kids, all singing a song about praising Jesus at the top of their lungs. And when they're done, they begged to sing another. It was tons of work getting to put on VBS, partially for me, but mostly for others. But watching the kids connect with Jesus.....That was Joy.

Or how about a year and a half ago, the first day we were without a Pastor, and unexpectedly without an organist. The congregation was in wonderful attendance and we a very loud and joyous a capella. We served each other in providing the music. We didn't let small burdens or personal concerns get the best of us. We came together and made a joyful noise. That too was joy.

Then I also looked at a very recent moment, when we decided to try continuous communion via the floor. While we were discussing the change, it wasn't pretty. Not many people were excited about the change. Many are still somewhat lukewarm to the idea, to an extent, myself included. But any concerns I had were quickly extinguished when I saw a well loved, seasoned, handicap member of our congregation suddenly able to share communion with the rest of us. Simply walking down the aisle and returning is much easier than navigating the steps. Watching this member take communion was again pure and unexpected joy. The controversy and discussions around the communion change no longer mattered to me. This was the right thing to do.

So what does all this stuff mean? Well looking back on it, the moments of joy came when I/we were focused on helping others and not our own purpose. When we focused only on our own purpose, we were often locked in differing opinions, labor, turmoil and controversy. But when we focused on helping others, the personal controversy melted quickly away and suddenly turned to joy. The controversy suddenly didn't really matter anymore.

And, when we were working for others, guess what. We were also serving the Lord. We were performing the Lord's work. Even though the journey may have been tough, performing the Lord's work brings a natural, pure, Godly, perfect joy.

If I could summarize in a nut shell my journey though the interim task force, it is that realization. Performing the Lord's work brings joy. And I know that all of my fellow ITF members and Church Days members would agree. Our goal is not to serve ourselves. Rather it is to serve God. And serving God will bring Joy.

As a congregation, we need to find that joy in service. And that service and joy will keep this congregation flourishing for many, many years to come.

Are you ready to serve and find that Godly joy?

Notes from the Side

This month, one of our Gospel readings will be the story of Jesus walking on water during the storm who is then joined by Peter (Matt. 14: 22 – 33). When I think about Peter walking on water with Jesus, I usually think what could have happened if Peter did not take his eyes off of Jesus. As long as Peter kept his eyes on Jesus, he was able to walk on water. But when he began to put his focus on the big waves that the storm was making while he was walking on water, he became afraid. Because he became afraid, Peter began to sink into the water instead of walking on it. When Peter began to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately, Jesus stretched forth his hand and pulled Peter out of the water and said, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?"

As long as Peter had faith and kept his eyes on Jesus, he was able to walk on water. Instead, Peter allowed fear and doubt to distract him from his focus...Jesus. Thankfully, Jesus was right there to save Peter from sinking and drowning in Sea of Galilee. There is a lesson to be learned right there: no matter how deep you may have sunk into your problems, Jesus is able to rescue you out of your problems and all you have to do is call out like Peter, "Lord, save me!" The Lord will save you because there is no problem too hard for God to handle.

Yes, Peter could have done a whole lot more while walking on water with Jesus if he would have kept his eyes on Him. Yet there is one good thing that we can say about Peter...he got out of the boat. Even though he may have failed while walking on water with Jesus because of his fears and doubts, Peter does deserve some credit for the fact that he DID get out of the boat. The question I have is, "Why didn't the other eleven disciples get out of the boat?" I think that the others were afraid, had doubts, and felt "safe" in the boat.

The retelling of this story hits me at a time in my life when I think that I'm sinking in the water just like Peter; when I feel that the bottom is falling out of my life. As I shared with all of you at the last Voters' Meeting, it is apparent that I don't fit the ELCA ministry model; therefore, I will not be pursuing the candidacy process to become an ELCA pastor. This has created a huge dark cloud (a storm cloud, if you will) in my life. I still hear Jesus calling me to "come" yet I have allowed fears and doubts to cloud my focus. Regardless of the hurdles that have been placed before me, I have decided to not be like the eleven and remain in the boat. I have decided to step out of the boat; to trust in Jesus and see where I will go from here. With the prayers and support from my family, my friends, and from all of you, I will do my best to go where Jesus wants me to go and do what He wants me to do. I know that if I keep my focus solely on Jesus and not on earthly matters, I will be blessed.

I can't help but wonder if the people of Peace are like the eleven who remained in the boat. How many of us feel

safe within our boats and don't want to take a leap of faith and get out? I think the "boats" in our lives are our comfort zones. Anytime that the Lord commands us to step out in faith to do His work but we allow fear or doubt to take control of us because we don't want to leave our comfort zones, we are in a "boat" that we don't want to leave.

Your boat may be your house, your car, your job, your money, your position at work, your relationship, your friends, or even your family. Surprisingly, I feel that other boats can even be our church traditions, practices, or other man-made rules which we classify as "religion". Our boats can be anything that makes us feel comfortable. Anytime we refuse to step out in faith to do a great work for the Lord because we don't want to get out of our boats because of the comfort zone it represents, we will miss out on the blessings that the Lord has for us.

Sisters and brothers, I believe that the Lord is standing in the water out in the stormy world today calling to the people of Peace to step out; to "come" and do His work. I realize that there are some fears and perhaps there are some doubts. But we need to learn from this Gospel lesson that no matter how adverse the situation may be, Jesus will be there with us to help us out. The situation may be dark and we can't see our way out yet, but don't fear, for Jesus will be right there to guide us through.

Will you, the people of Peace, make the decision to stay in the boat; to cling to your boat? Or will you, the people of Peace, step out in faith keeping your focus on Jesus?
